International Students Financial Aid & Scholarships

The Admissions and Financial Aid Committee, in keeping with Clark University's commitment to a strong international presence on campus, provides financial assistance to a number of international students each year.

Competition for this assistance is extremely keen and the awards are based on both academic merit and financial need. Since the ability to meet the cost of attendance at Clark University is a factor, the admissions process is need-aware. Several applicants each year show excellent academic records but do not demonstrate the necessary financial ability. It is not unusual for the Committee to deny an application on financial grounds even though the applicant is academically qualified.

Clark does not offer financial assistance to cover the full cost of attendance. Personal expenses such as room and board are the responsibility of the student. Total expenses for the 2004-05 academic year are estimated at nearly \$38,000, and, since our maximum award is full-tuition (\$29,300 next year),

we expect all applicants to be prepared to pay AT LEAST \$10,000 for each year of study. Note also that the average award this year was \$17,000, which means most students will pay more than \$20,000 per year. In addition, a student should not rely on the possibility of working while in school. The United States Government prohibits international students from working outside the University. On-campus employment opportunities are limited and part-time only per government regulations. This should therefore not be considered a possible source of significant income.

International Financial Aid Application

Financial need is determined by the analysis of information provided on the College Board's International Student Financial Aid Application (ISFAA) or Clark University's own Financial Aid Application. You should also submit supporting documents in the form of employer and/or bank statements. Since Clark can only give partial financial awards, it is expected that students will be prepared to finance their education with funds from their families, sponsors or sources other than Clark University. It is important that students and their families be realistic as they plan to apply for admission to Clark. A student must provide proof of financial support in order to receive a visa for study in the United States.

Global Scholars Program

In addition to the International Awards, we are pleased to announce the creation of the **Global Scholars Program (GSP)**. The GSP builds on Clark's long-standing commitment to providing a challenging education with a global view. A separate application and recommendation are required to be considered for this scholarship.

Successful candidates will be first-year applicants* who have the demonstrated potential to provide leadership in their community and the world and who are committed to making a difference.

Clark invites applications from students who are not permanent residents or citizens of the United States, as well as US citizens/permanent residents who reside overseas and will complete their entire secondary school education outside the US. Candidates should be outstanding students who are also deeply engaged in their school or local communities. View the profiles past GSP recipients.

Students admitted to the Global Scholars Program will receive:



- A scholarship of no less than \$12,000 ** (or \$48,000 for four years contingent upon meeting academic standards for renewal);
- A guaranteed \$2,500 stipend for a paid internship or research assistantship taken for academic credit during the summer following the sophomore or junior year;
- A guaranteed place in the International Studies Stream and the Global Scholar will be a part of a supportive network of faculty, students, staff, alumni and peers;
- Participation in the Global Scholars mentor program, including a semi-annual dinner hosted by Dr. John Bassett, President of Clark University. In addition to a faculty advisor, staff or alumni leadership mentors will support Global Scholars.

To apply to the Global Scholars Program students must:

- Submit a regular application for admission to Clark University, along with all required supporting credentials;
- Complete a brief application for the GSP;
- Submit an essay that addresses an issue of global significance;
- Submit a letter of reference that speaks specifically to the applicant's promise as a leader in the community and the world at large;

- Deadline for receipt of the completed applications (Admissions & GSP) is January
- * Students transferring from another college or university are not eligible for the GSP.
- ** Applicants with financial need greater than the amount of the Global Scholars award may be eligible for additional need-based financial assistance. To be considered, international applicants must submit the International Student Financial Aid Form, and US citizens must submit the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA) and College Board PROFILE form.

Students in Clark's regionally-recognized horticulture and agriculture program receive hands-on training in the campus greenhouse. Lewis D. Cannell Library

The Cannell Library provides services and borrowing privileges to the Clark community. The library maintains over 55,000 volumes and over 500 periodicals as well as current newspapers, pamphlets, Washington State publications and audio-visual materials. Membership in PORTALS offers and electronic network linking member libraries and their online catalogs, and access to selected databases.

Art Classroom

The popular fine arts program at Clark provides expert instruction in multiple art mediums, including drawing, painting, photography, ceramics and sculpture. Lab space for hands-on learning in all of the arts is located in the Frost Arts Center, including a pottery kiln room. Students have the opportunity to

Clark's award-winning Culinary Arts program prepares students for positions as chefs, bakers, restaurant managers and other food service industry careers with hands-on training in state-of-the-art facilities. Clark graduates have found employment as restaurant owners, chefs at small to large restaurants, in food service operations, in bakeries, and have even prepared meals for the U.S. President.

Diesel Technology

In the Diesel Technology lab at Clark College, students master the skills needed to perform maintenance and repairs on light, medium and heavy-duty trucks and in industrial applications such as agriculture, construction, and marine industries. Equipment available for training includes Catepiller, Halton, Cummins, and other industry standard brands.

History

Clark University is a teaching and research institution founded in 1887. Clark is the oldest graduate institution in the United States. Clark is one of only three New England universities, with Harvard and Yale, to be a founding member of the prestigious Association of American Universities.

Clark's first president was G. Stanley Hall, founder of the American Psychological Association, who earned the first Ph.D. in psychology in this country at Harvard. Clark has played a prominent role in the development of psychology as a distinguished discipline in the United States. Clark was the location for Sigmund Freud's famous "Clark Lectures" in 1909, introducing psychoanalysis to this country.

Clark also has played an important role in the development of geography as a discipline. Clark has granted more Ph.D.s in this environmentally related area than any other school in the nation. The George Perkins Marsh Institute was the first research center created to study the human dimensions of global environmental change.

Researchers who have held Clark appointments include A.A. Michelson, the first U.S. Nobel Prize winner in the sciences; and Robert Goddard, the father of the space age and the inventor of rocket technology. Other researchers at Clark, for instance, measured the windchill factor, defined chemical double bonding, developed research leading to the birth control pill, and made the first breakthrough in understanding how brain tissue regenerates itself.

Mission Statement

Clark University's mission is to educate undergraduate and graduate students to be imaginative and contributing citizens of the world, and to advance the frontiers of knowledge and understanding through rigorous scholarship and creative effort.

Clark's academic community has long been distinguished by the pursuit of scientific inquiry and humanistic studies, enlivened by a concern for significant social issues. Among many other scholarly endeavors, Clark contributes to understanding human development, assessing relationships between people and the environment, and managing risk in a technological society.

Clark is dedicated to being a dynamic community of learners able to thrive in today's increasingly interrelated societies. The University maintains a



national and international character, attracting highcaliber students and faculty from all quarters of the globe. As a university residing in an urban context, Clark also strives to address the needs and opportunities of contemporary urban life.

Accreditation

Clark University is accredited by the New England Association of Schools and Colleges, Inc. through its Commission on Institutions of Higher Education.

Accreditation of an institution by the New England Association indicates that it meets or exceeds criteria for the assessment of institutional quality periodically applied through a peer-review process. An accredited college or university is one which has available the necessary resources to achieve its stated purposes through appropriate educational programs, is substantially doing so, and gives reasonable evidence that it will continue to do so in the foreseeable future. Institutional integrity is also addressed through accreditation.
