### The Ashland University Center for English Studies (ACCESS)



The English word "access" means "entrance" or "way in." The Ashland University Center for English Studies (ACCESS) can be your entrance to English learning, academic studies, and cultural life in the United States of America. ACCESS has provided over 30 years of service and offers the finest possible English-learning environment. Our teachers have all taught for several years at the ACCESS program.

ACCESS provides international students opportunities to improve communication skills in



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American English and acquaints them with American people and culture. The Center offers a program of classes in reading, writing, structure, and speaking/listening which is designed to prepare students to participate effectively in University classes and daily American life. In addition, the center provides numerous and varied cultural activities and field trips to points of interest in Ohio.

### Classroom Programs



You can start your English studies in ACCESS whenever it is convenient for you. ACCESS offers six terms of instruction each year. The 7.5 week terms start in January, March, May, July, September and October. Classes meet Monday through Friday for four hours a day. In other words, you will have classes 20 hours per week.

After an initial placement test, you will normally be assigned to classes in reading, writing, speaking and listening and structure. In addition, you will participate in a Discovery Class that mixes English study, culture learning and interactions with Americans. Discovery Classes focus on such topics as family, education, minorities and volunteer service. The classes will also give you the opportunity to have out-of-class interviews and casual conversations with American students and people about key aspects of American culture.

ACCESS classes are small for you to receive maximum benefits from your instruction and personal attention from your instructors. Classes range in size from three to 15. Most classes have fewer than 10 students. Students come from different countries so the language of classroom instruction is diverse English. Click for a current profile of students in the program.

ACCESS offers four levels of instruction; most students require two terms (one semester) to complete each level. You will be assigned to the level that best matches your English learning needs. In addition to your daily classes, you will be assigned up to 10 hours per week for individual work in the language laboratory. This facility is equipped with audiotape stations as well as computers and interactive video stations. For your success in your English learning, you will be instructed how to use and take advantage of the laboratory equipment.




**LEVEL 1** (Beginning) presents fundamental English grammar patterns and basic English for communication.

**LEVELS 2 and 3** (Low and High Intermediate) introduce academic reading and continue practice with speaking and listening skills.

**LEVEL 4** (Advanced) prepares you for the kind of materials you may encounter as a university student. Depending on the needs of the students in the program, special courses such as English for graduate studies, TOEFL preparation, or conversation strategies may be offered. Continuing students at this level may, with the advice and permission of the ACCESS Director, attend one or two university courses in addition to the English classes. You can also receive academic credit for these courses if you later enroll as a full-time student at Ashland University.

If you apply to Ashland University, you can request conditional admission to the university upon completion of the ACCESS program. You can thus be comfortable in knowing you will be able to undertake your university studies at Ashland University after finishing your English study.

### Activities Program



As an ACCESS student, you can be part of a trip or special event offered by ACCESS each week of the term. Field trips may take you to see professional sports, visit museums and amusement parks, attend cultural events, or shop. Special events may include picnics, canoeing and horseback riding during summer as well as ice skating and skiing in the winter. In your free time you can also enjoy golf, fishing, hiking and swimming in the nearby community parks.



In addition to joining weekly group activities, you may individually visit a Friendship Family in Ashland for a dinner or family activity on a regular basis. ACCESS also arranges special activities for its students to meet elementary, junior high, and high school students. You can introduce a young student to your country as you improve your ability to use everyday English.



You are also encouraged to join campus clubs and activities such as dances, movies, plays, lectures, concerts and athletic events. All of the University facilities are available for your use. These include the library, language laboratory, student center and snack bar, computer centers, music practice rooms and all athletic facilities including the soccer fields, indoor swimming pool, tennis courts, indoor track, gymnasium and fitness center. The campus newspaper will keep you informed of events.

### Instructors

Your instructors in ACCESS are experienced language teachers with master's degrees or equivalent professional training and experience in teaching English to speakers of other languages (TESOL). They have all taught for several years in the ACCESS program as well as overseas. All ACCESS instructors have lived abroad for extended periods and have abilities in languages other than English. They know, from their personal experiences as well as from their professional training, how it



feels to struggle and learn a new language in a new culture.

ACCESS instructors help you use the language for real communication, not for answering merely questions on language tests. They mix classroom study with activities that let you practice how to improve your skills in talking to Americans and to others who do not share your first language.

ACCESS instructors do more than teach excellent ESL classes; they help create a caring, family-like atmosphere for you. They encourage you in your studies and help you adjust to the culture here. They talk to you daily to check your progress and to get to know you personally. They will join you in recreational activities and help you answer questions and solve problems that you could encounter in your new environment.

### Housing

Ashland University offers you seven modern residence halls on campus, each only a few minutes from all the campus facilities. You will have a residence hall room reserved for you according to the preferences you mark on the application form or on the housing preference card.



ACCESS students live in the same residence halls with Americans. Residence hall rooms are available year round. Except in summer terms, it is usually possible to live with American roommates.

You will have a variety and plenty of delicious food to eat in the award-winning Convo. This buffet-style cafeteria and fast-food Eagle's Nest are for students living on-campus as part of the meal plan. Others may eat there, too, for a reasonable price.

On-campus housing for married students is not provided. However, moderately priced off-campus housing is available for married students. Other students with special needs may also choose to live off campus.

ACCESS students can live in the dormitory during breaks without additional fees.

Because so many of the Ashland University students live on-campus, there is a very active social and activity schedule. There is always something educational, exciting, and fun for students to be involved in.

### Other Services





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From the beginning of your stay in Ashland, ACCESS will take care of you. ACCESS will meet you at Cleveland Hopkins Airport or Columbus Airport when you arrive. We will help you with all your settling-in needs: registering for classes, checking into your residence hall, opening a bank account, getting a tour of campus, shopping, and calling home. This kind of personal attention is what we mean by "Accent on the Individual." We will help you grow in confidence as we help you grow in English skills.

Besides the support you will receive from the ACCESS instructors, you can expect support from your classmates as well. The ACCESS spirit of caring for each person helps you make friends with students from many countries who can encourage you in your studies.

When you are ready to finish your English studies, we will help you plan your first semester of university classes. You will be able to enter Ashland University when you successfully complete ACCESS without needing to meet a specific TOEFL requirement.

Ashland University Rated Among Top Midwest Master's Level Institutions by U.S. News  
 Ashland University has been placed in the top tier of Midwest master's level institutions in the recently released 2005 edition of U.S. News & World Reports' America's Best Colleges survey.

The annual survey ranks colleges and universities in up to 14 categories based on data from the prior school year and on actual surveys. The categories include graduation rate, freshman retention, acceptance rate, student/faculty ratio, standardized test scores, alumni giving, peer assessment, percent of class size under 20 and over 50, percent of full-time faculty, and percent of freshmen in the top of their high school class. This year, 572 colleges and universities nationwide were ranked by region in the master's-level category, which includes institutions that provide a full range of undergraduate and master's programs but few doctoral programs.

Ashland University offers master's degrees in education, business and theological studies, and doctoral degrees in education and Christian ministry.

**Dining Service Rated Best in Nation**



After capturing first place among medium sized schools 10 times in the standard menu competition of the National Association of College and University Food Services (NACUFS), AU entered and finished first in the special event/theme dinner competition in 2004. AU tied Brown University and ahead of second place Salisbury University and Vanderbilt University. Utah State University and Kansas State University tied for third place.



**No. 1 student programming in the nation**



Ashland University's Campus Activities Board has been recognized by the National Association for College Activities for providing the No. 1 student activities programming in the nation.

AU received NACA's Excellence in Programming Award, taking first place in the category of undergraduate institutions with fewer than 2,000 students on campus.

The NACA noted that the award recognizes significant achievements in the planning and presentation of programs by college and university program boards, as well as the programming calendar that includes a variety of programs planned for a number of target audiences.

The Campus Activities Board also was featured in the inaugural edition of Campus Activities Journal, published by the Association for the Promotion of Campus Activities.

- A private, comprehensive university founded in 1878, Ashland University is located midway between Cleveland and Columbus in northeast Ohio. Ashland's philosophy of "Accent on the Individual" assures that students receive the individual attention essential for educational growth.
- Besides most traditional liberal arts majors, the University offers a wide range of majors in business and education. In total, the University offers more than 60 majors including hotel/restaurant management, radio/TV, international studies, toxicology/environmental science, and sports medicine, which are unusual in an institution of this size. The programs offered students are enhanced by the University Honors Program, the Ashbrook Center (political science and public affairs), the Gill Center (economic education), the visiting artist program and the writer-in-residence program.
- Ashland and its programs are accredited by North Central Association of Colleges and Schools, Association of Collegiate Business Schools and Programs, National Council for Accreditation of Teacher Education, National Association of Schools of Music, the National League for Nursing, Council on Social Work Education, and American Chemical Society.
- Faculty: more than 80 percent of whom hold doctorates or the highest degree in their fields.
- Financial Aid: Approximately 90 percent of full-time, undergraduate students receive AU funded grants and scholarships. The average award, including federal, state and institutional dollars, is approximately \$9,400.
- Students enjoy Ashland's food court, which has been judged the No. 1 dining service in the



nation for five years by the National Association of College and University Food Service.

- Ashland's 120-acre campus, which has been termed one of the most beautiful in the state, features 44 modern buildings and is landscaped with many trees, brick walks and flower gardens.
- Ashland offers one of only three NCAA Division II athletic programs in Ohio. The institution's success in 10 men's and 10 women's sports is evidenced by many national rankings and more than 600 All-American athletes.
- In addition to the main campus offerings, Ashland University programs are offered at 13 program centers throughout the state.

**Campus Facilities**

**Andrews Hall**



Houses the History/Political Science, Psychology, Criminal Justice/Sociology, Social Work and Nursing Departments. Includes seven lecture classrooms and one laboratory.

**Arts and Humanities Building**



Houses the Art, Communication Arts, English, Music, Philosophy, and Theatre Departments. Includes one computer lab, one theatre lab, three music labs, five art labs and six lecture rooms. This building is also home to the Hugo Young Theatre for the Performing Arts, Coburn Art Gallery, the Writing Center and radio/TV studios.

**Bixler Hall**



The College of Education is located in Bixler Hall along with the Reading Recovery Center and the Telego Center for Educational Improvement. Six lecture rooms are included.

**Clayton Hall**



Houses the Hotel/Restaurant Management program and includes one lecture room.

**Gill Center for Business and Economic Education**



The Economics Department, the Evening/Weekend Program Office, and one lecture room are located in the Gill Center.

**John M. Ashbrook Center for Public Affairs**



Located in the Library, the Center provides an academic forum for the study of the principles and practices of American constitutional government and politics.



### **Kettering Science Center**



Houses the Biology, Toxicology, Environmental Science, Geology, Chemistry and Physics Departments. The building includes eight science laboratories, one computer lab and five lecture classrooms.

### **Library**



Nine-story building housing the University's library holdings. In addition, AU is a member of OhioLINK, giving students borrowing access to more than 31 million library items statewide and full-text search access to over 90 research databases. The Ashbrook Center for Public Affairs, the coin and paper money collection in the Numismatic Center, International Student Services, and the Weltmer Instructional Program Center of the College of Education are located in the Library.

### **Miller Hall**



Houses the Business Administration and Religion Departments as well as the Master of Business Administration offices. The building includes ten lecture classroom and two computer labs.

### **Patterson Instructional Technology Center**

Houses the Mathematics/Computer Science and Foreign Languages Departments and the Center for English Studies. The building includes seven lecture rooms and a computer lab.



### **Phyllis Jacobson Kates Center for Family and Consumer Sciences**



Includes two lecture classrooms as well as food and textile laboratories.

### **Physical Education Center**



Houses the Sport Sciences Department and the Athletics Offices, and includes four lecture classrooms in addition to three basketball courts, two racquetball courts, wrestling room and a natatorium.

### **Richard E. and Sandra J. Dauch College of Business and Economics**



Opened for spring semester of the 2003-04 academic year, this state-of-the-art building houses Business Administration, Economics, and the MBA program. Includes the Burton D. Morgan Center for Entrepreneurial Studies, an executive education



center, state-of-the-art trading room, computer labs, tiered lecture hall, and a product development lab.

**Athletic Facilities**

In addition to the Physical Education Center, include Conard Field House with banked track, tennis courts and batting cage; Wurster Fitness Center with free weights and nautilus equipment; Donges Field, baseball complex; Sarver Field, football practice and track facility; Community Stadium, a 5,400-seat football stadium and all-weather track; and the AU Soccer Complex.



**Founders Hall**



Houses the Office of Admission, Academic Advising, Registrar, Residence Life, Development Office, Public Relations, EagleCard Office, President Office, Provost Office, and Business Office.

**Hawkins-Conard Student Center**



Houses Student Activities, Student Affairs, Counseling, Career Development and Safety Services offices as well as the Student Health Center, a fitness center, bookstore, Eagles' Nest snack bar, mailroom and several lounges.

**John C. Myers Convocation Center**

Housing the University's dining services in the Food Court and includes the Accent Room restaurant and conference facilities for 2,800 people.



**Memorial Chapel**



Houses the Religious Life Office and Center for Religious Life and meeting space for student Christian organizations.

**Redwood Hall**



This building is used for special events including guest speakers and performers.

**Student Residences**



Include three AU two-bedroom apartment buildings for upperclass men and women; seven residence halls with sorority suites and honors floors; and fraternity houses.

**Columbus Center**





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Houses the M.Ed., MBA, Bachelor's Plus, Professional Development Services and Ashland Theological School programs in Columbus, Ohio. Includes three computer labs and 26 education/meeting rooms.

Includes over 80,000 volumes and over 500 periodical publications. The library's catalog is a joint computer catalog with Ashland University and includes all holdings of the AU Library, and AU Media Center in addition to the Seminary library.

**Elyria Program Center**



Located at the Lorain County Community College in Elyria, Ohio. Includes classrooms, library, and media space for AU's undergraduate, Bachelor's Plus, and Professional Development programs.

**Sandberg Leadership Center**




Houses classrooms for the Doctor of Ministry program and other specialized seminars and conferences. The Smetzer Counseling Center, which occupies one wing of the center, contains offices and counseling labs.

**Massillon/Stark Center**



Provides facilities for the M.Ed., MBA, Bachelor's Plus, and Professional Development programs in Massillon, Ohio. Includes six classrooms with wireless network systems.

**Dining Services**



**Roger Darling Memorial Library**



Ashland University's Student Dining is an award winning nationally recognized dining program. The newly renovated dining hall caters to about 2,400 students daily. The dining facility was designed in the style of a "Food Court" featuring fresh pasta, rotisserie chicken, sizzling salads, eggs to order and much more. The Dining Hall is open from 7 a.m. to 7 p.m., Monday through Friday and on Saturday and Sunday with a brunch from 11:15 a.m. to 1:30 p.m.



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and dinner from 4:15 to 6:30 p.m. Summer hours may vary depending upon customer needs.



**Catering & Conferences**

The award winning Ashland University Catering department is host to 1,100 events annually, bringing more than 100,000 guests to campus each year. Events range from coffee breaks to formal dinners for up to 1,000 people. Such dignitaries as Colin Powell, Prime Minister Margaret Thatcher and Ronald Reagan have visited the campus and have had events catered in their honor by the department. The staff is fully equipped and qualified to provide service to any on-campus site.



Most catered events are held in the 20,000-square-foot, air-conditioned John C. Myers Convocation Center. The largest banquet facility between Cleveland and Columbus offers six rooms for hosting your event with a variety of configurations possible. The rooms range from seating for six at a table arrangement to theatre style seating for 2,000. All of the amenities for adding the right touch to any corporate meeting, wedding reception, class reunion, conference, seminar, family reunion or any other type of event is available by just making one phone call.

A special area of focus for this development is the summer conference season, which runs from mid-May to mid-August. An average of 35 groups a summer visit our campus, ranging from church

campus to cheerleading groups and everything in between. The conferences range in size from 50 to 2,200 participants. All accommodations from meals, housing, meeting space, etc. are handled through the Catering and Conferences Department. The University has six residence halls which provide housing for more than 1,400 people.

Another aspect of the Dining and Conference services is the Accent Room which offers fine dining to the public. The 100-seat restaurant is open Monday through Friday from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. and for Sunday Brunch from 11:30 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. Display cooking is a special feature that is offered to customers.

**Ashland University Economic Impact**

- Ashland University is one of Ashland County's largest employers, employing approximately 725 full-time and 300 part-time employees and possessing an operating budget of \$93 million.
- A total payroll of nearly \$38 million means a large employee spending turnover in the Ashland/Mansfield area. This equates to a bi-weekly payroll of \$1.5 million, with the majority of those earned dollars being spent in this area for purchases ranging from food and housing to automobiles and services.
- Nearly 74 percent of the University's employees live in the Ashland area with many owning their own homes and contributing heavily to the tax base for support of schools and community services. In 2003, University employees paid \$490,000 in city taxes and \$1,260,000 in state taxes.
- More than 94 percent of the University's revenues comes from outside the Ashland area in the form of tuition, fees, gifts and grants.
- Of the University's total 6,800 students, approximately 2,150 are full-time, undergraduate students, making Ashland their home for nine months out of each year. Approximately 75 percent live on campus, while the remaining live off campus in apartments or houses.
- Another 4,100 students are taking graduate courses in business administration, education or theology on the Ashland campus and program centers throughout the state. Many of these students live and work in Ashland and the surrounding area, while others are part-time and evening students who drive to campus and buy



gasoline, meals and miscellaneous items in the community.

- Many of the University's more than 30,000 alumni, as well as trustees and parents of students, come to campus for special events such as Family Weekend, Homecoming and Commencement. These alumni, parents, trustees and guests contribute heavily to the area's economy through the purchase of food, lodging, gasoline and incidentals.
- Ashland University hosts many conferences, clinics, camps and workshops, bringing more than 40,000 people annually to the University.
